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FROM THE PRESIDENT







The Digestive Disease National Coalition (DDNC), a national advocacy organization for patients with digestive illnesses, hosted its 31st annual Public Policy Forum virtually March 4th through 9th. Dr. Bryan Green, President of the SCGA Foundation is also serving a two year term as President of the DDNC. The DDNC was integral in advocating for the successful passage of legislation last year to remove the "Polyp Penalty" whereby a Medicare screening colonoscopy would become diagnostic if a polyp was removed during the procedure and thus require cost sharing by the patient rather than being fully covered as preventative. The DDNC's current major legislative objective is preventing cost shifting by insurance companies and pharmacy benefit managers (PBM) to increase the cost of medications to patients along with preventing non-medical switching of medications by insurers.
